The cost will be about one-fourth what it would be to do it later.

John Hudgend and Vorlin Stocks have added to their long list of services rendered the Association by rebuilding the spillway at the south end of the dem, and distributing one-half ton of fertilizer in the lake.

One more load of fertilizer will be required this year for maximum fish production.

FUTURE FISHING ASSURED

Do we have fish in Wildwood Lake, This is the question that has been asked by many in the past, and for the first time the Wildwood Lake Home Owners' Ass'n., Inc. can proudly answer YES;

Friday, October 4th, 1952 a shipment of fish was received from the Federal Government, consisting of approximately 1500 Bass, 375 Channel Cat and 1000 Blue Gill. This means that in the past sixty days Wildwood Lake has been stocked with at least 3500 fish, since on two previous occasions the lake was stocked with several hundred Blue Gill.

Yes, we have fish in Wildwood Lake. Results -- Good fishing in the not too distant future.
